### **Contract for the Suncrest Street Reconductor Project**

The Board approved a contract with Irby Construction Company, Inc. for the reconstruction and reconductor of a feeder on Suncrest Street.

#### **Contract Renewal for BTU Work Zone Traffic Control Services**

The Board approved a renewal of a contract with Altus Traffic Management, LLC for traffic control services.

#### **Discussion of Rural Electric System Bond Sale**

Mr. William J. Smith, Chief Financial Officer, discussed the recent sale of Bryan Rural Electric System Revenue Bonds, Series 2024. Mr. Smith commended the underwriters for their efforts, and highlighted the favorable sale rate of 3.95%. Mr. Smith announced that BTU's Rural Electric System rating was upgraded from AA- to AA by Fitch Ratings and Standard & Poor's rating of A+ was affirmed.

**Need a new appliance?** If you time it right, you can enjoy a tax-free purchase of qualifying appliances soon. Texas' Energy Star® Sales Tax Holiday occurs in conjunction with Memorial Day weekend annually.


This year it runs Saturday, May 25, to Monday, May 27.

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can buy, and you don't need to give the seller an exemption certificate to buy items tax free.

Here are some of the Energy Star® appliances eligible for the tax exemption:

- Air conditioners (with a sales price of \$6,000 or less)
- Refrigerators (with a sales price of \$2,000 or less)
- · Ceiling fans
- LED and compact fluorescent lightbulbs
- · Clothes washers
- Dishwashers
- Dehumidifiers





Keep in mind that appliances purchased for just a few dollars over the allowable amounts will be fully taxed. For example, a refrigerator that costs \$2,050 will be taxed on the entire purchase price, not just the \$50 in excess of the limit. Similarly, if an item's sales price is within the price cap, but an additional delivery fee pushes it over the limit, the entire purchase is taxable. Staying within these guidelines is a small price to pay for a significant discount.

By taking advantage of these sales tax holidays, you can make upgrades that will help you save money on your utility bills and on state and local sales taxes. Visit **comptroller.texas.gov** for the full details.

In today's tech-driven world, lithium-ion batteries power many devices, from smartphones to scooters to electric cars. However, understanding the potential risks associated with lithium-ion batteries is crucial for their safe use.

Lithium-ion batteries can pose safety risks, primarily due to the possibility of thermal runaway—a rapid increase in temperature leading to fires or explosions. This can happen due to overcharging, physical damage, or exposure to extreme temperatures.

### Here's what you need to know to mitigate the risks and stay safe:

### Use genuine chargers for devices.

Stick to official chargers provided by the device manufacturer. Generic or third-party chargers may not have the same safety features and could damage the battery.

### Avoid exposing batteries to extreme temperatures.

Lithium-ion batteries can be degraded by extreme heat or cold. Keep your devices away from direct sunlight and never leave them in your car.

### Do not overcharge batteries.

It's tempting to leave your phone or other devices plugged in overnight, but overcharging can stress the battery and increase the risk of overheating. Unplug your device once it's fully charged. Make sure chargers have mechanisms that limit the voltage and current while charging to avoid damaging the battery. Do not charge devices on soft surfaces like beds or couches.

### Handle with care.

Avoid dropping or subjecting your devices to physical trauma. A damaged battery is more prone to failure.

### Stay informed.

Keep an eye on product recalls and safety notices from device manufacturers. If there's a known issue with your device's battery, take appropriate action to resolve it as soon as possible.

### **SAFETY TIPS FOR ELECTRIC VEHICLE OWNERS**

### Follow charging guidelines.

Use dedicated EV charging stations whenever possible and follow the manufacturer's recommendations for charging times and procedures.

### Monitor battery health.

Pay attention to any warning lights or messages on your dashboard that indicate battery issues. Regularly inspect the condition of your EV's batteries and have them serviced as needed.

### Avoid full discharges.

Try to avoid letting your EV's battery completely discharge. This can reduce its lifespan and increase the risk of damage.

### Plan for Emergencies.

Familiarize yourself with the location of your EV's emergency disconnect and learn how to safely exit the vehicle in the event of a battery-related emergency.

### Dispose of old batteries properly.

When it's time to replace your device or EV battery, don't toss it in the trash. Lithium-ion batteries can cause fires during transport. Instead look for locations where batteries can be recycled or collected at a household hazardous waste site.

Unsurprisingly, Caleb's entrepreneurial spirit and servant attitude led to him being selected as a participant in the Bryan/College Station Chamber of Commerce's Junior

Leadership Brazos Program in 2023. The program identifies young leaders that are brought together to learn more about the community. They get a behind-the-scenes look at how our community operates in areas such as local government, financial institutions, law enforcement, and more. Caleb said he had the opportunity to meet the "movers and shakers" of the community. He enjoyed his experience so much that he sought out Chamber of Commerce staff and offered to sponsor a student the following year while still enrolled in high school himself. When the opportunity arose for the 2024 Junior Leadership Brazos Class, he did just that. He hopes to continue to "pay it forward," and sponsor more students in the future.



Each day, Caleb clears junk and drives himself, schedules his staff, and plans for his growing business while still tackling schoolwork. He will graduate in May from Bryan Collegiate High School, and will be attending Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi at the RELLIS Campus with hopes to study Business Management. In the future, he plans to take a back seat from the daily physical work to focus more on the management of his business in order to complete his degree. Long term, Caleb looks forward to continuing to grow BCS Junk Removal as well as investing in other small businesses and real estate. Caleb says he will always be involved in the service industry; helping people is what he enjoys the most.
