BOARD MEETING NOTES

THE BTU BOARD OF DIRECTORS MFT ON MONDAY, JANUARY 11, 2016 AND DISCUSSED THE FOLLOWING TOPICS:

OPERATIONS

Gary Miller presented the safety statistics for the previous month to the BTU Board of Directors, stating BTU had one recordable incident and no vehicle incidents for the month of December.

DISCUSSION OF TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM (TAP) GRANT

Randy Trimble stated that in early 2015, BTU and the City of Bryan Engineering departments participated in a competitive TAP grant process for federal monies to improve safety along FM158 from SH6 (Earl Rudder Freeway) to Elmo Weedon Road with BTU being responsible for 30% of the cost and the TAP grant paying the remaining 70%. A proposal for a project that included four miles of street lighting along FM158 was submitted and selected by TxDOT. Mr. Trimble stated that if BTU accepted the grant, all monies would need to be used in 2016. The BTU Board directed Staff to move forward and present a contract for construction to the BTU Board at a later date.

BOARD MEMBER ART HUGHES

A Strong Commitment to Community

rt Hughes was born in Houston and attended Texas A&M University to study Architecture Construction (now called Construction Science). He's considered Bryan home since 1995, when he returned with his wife Vicki, after his three children had graduated high school.

"I worked for the largest national home builder in New York City and that opportunity moved us to Manhattan, New Jersey, Northern Virginia and Florida," Art said. "We moved back to Bryan in the late '70s, left again for Houston in '81 and moved back to Bryan for good in '95 – there was a year in Denver somewhere along the way."

As BTU's newest board member, he isn't a newcomer to the board. Art served as the ex-officio member for four years while he served on the Bryan City Council from 2009 to 2015.

"I'm happy to be on the Board," Art said. "I have a lot of respect for the Board and while the membership has changed over the years, BTU leadership has remained constant. The BTU staff provides lots of information to the Board, so it makes the job easier."

Returning to Bryan, Art shifted from construction to real estate full time. A co-worker pushed for him to get active in local government.

A year before the Beatles released a song with the same name, there was a local group called The Citations with Arthur Hughes that had a top 20 hit on WTAW with a song called *Help*. With his band, he played gigs locally at the Knights of Columbus Hall, and in nearby cities like Brenham and Rockdale.

"I was convinced to serve on the Zoning Board of Adjustments and then a former Councilmember asked me to be on the Planning and Zoning Commission," Art said. "I served for seven years as a P&Z member and got immersed in the City and the challenges we face weekly. When the chance came, I wanted to run for City Council. I lost. The person who beat me encouraged me to run again."



He did, winning and serving two terms on the Bryan City Council, and serving as Mayor Pro Tem for his last year on Council. "As an ex-officio member, I learned so much about the industry. There are not a lot of 'BTU's' around, especially in cities the size of Bryan. I'm very impressed with the operation and believe that BTU is where it needs to be and heading in the right direction."

DOWNTOWN BRYAN - NORTH When Vision Becomes Reality

It was always on the drawing board, always in the "grand plan." But as with many large-scale projects, there is a lot of groundwork that must be done. Now, a new frontier is opening up, adding more unique and fresh new attractions to Downtown Bryan.

In 2001, the Downtown Bryan Master Plan laid out a glimpse of the future for the corridors along Main Street and Bryan Avenue. To get to that future, the past would have to be conserved, and in the case of the North End, much of the past would have to

be cleared, consolidated and prepared for new development.

"With the South End of downtown you have historic buildings: the Carnegie History Center, the Queen Theatre, the LaSalle Hotel, other historic buildings," said Joey Dunn, Deputy City Manager for the City of Bryan. "The redevelopment of that portion of downtown was more about preserving the old. The North End is different. For the most part it's all new."

The preservation of Downtown Bryan's historic buildings and facades

was vital to the overall plan, but while that revitalization was taking shape, the City of Bryan was laying the foundation for a downtown redevelopment boom in the North End.

Dunn said the North End has been a much larger and longer project because many of the North End land tracts had to be cleared of the previous structures, new infrastructure was required, and the City purchased many smaller lots in order to combine them into larger tracts. This created the opportunity for large-scale projects



that would appeal to developers.

"That's a significant amount of redevelopment. We've not had that scale of redevelopment in Downtown Bryan in recent times," Dunn said. "Things are beginning to happen – not just through the City of Bryan's efforts - but also through some key publicprivate partnerships."

Two of those blocks will be taken by the Jordan Center, a \$30 million residential and retail development proposal from BCS Modern Living, LLC. The project will include a fivestory building and parking garage, residential units, mixed retail, and the preservation of the historic Kimbell Feed Co. building. Construction is expected to start in the summer of 2016, and be completed by the summer of 2018.

Another block will be the site of the 500 Bryan North project. This mixed-use development will be constructed in four phases and has a three-year window for completion. This construction is also expected to start in the summer of 2016, and be completed by the summer of 2018.

And then there is the Ice House, the anchor at the intersection of Main Street and Martin Luther King Street. Dunn says that by mid-2016 there will be visible changes made to the historic building that will help get it ready for business. What business opens in the

Ice House first still remains to be seen but possibilities include a restaurant, retail, and special event meeting space.

"Two of these three ventures are local investors and local developers," Dunn said. "It's remarkable to see everything begin. But this isn't an accident."

Dunn explained that these plans are in keeping with the Downtown Bryan Master Plan adopted in 2001. "This area was envisioned that it would be mostly residential, but would have a mix of commercial and residential. These developments are in keeping with that original vision."

That vision is going to produce an environment that is more modern, and more urban than anything else in downtown.

"I think you'll have a different look, different feel, different type of activity,"



Dunn said. "With these new developments, we'll have close to 200 residential units. Which means people living down there. Which means people need milk and bread. We have lots of neat lofts, but this will really add a lot of missing elements to downtown redevelopment, including demand for more service-related retail."

The City of Bryan's long-term investment in the North end of Downtown Bryan is finally paying off. "Once the North End starts," Dunn said, "there is so much opportunity, you'll see some interesting things happen."

y husband and I love old houses, and when we had an opportunity to purchase our first home, we knew what we were looking for.

We bought our home in the Eastside Historic District in Bryan two years ago, and one of the first things we did before we moved in was to have new insulation blown into the attic and overhead crawlspaces.

Luckily we were able to utilize BTU's **SmartHOME** program, and we got a rebate of more than \$400. That's a nice chunk of change, especially when you've just spent a lot of your savings on a down payment.

Our house is two stories, and is 77 years old. But thanks to the new insulation, our electric bills during the summer have actually been cheaper than they were in our small rental house, which was about half the size of our new home.

Of the three elements of the **SmartHOME** program, we were only able to work on one of them - insulation.
