BOARD MEETING NOTES

THE BTU BOARD OF DIRECTORS MET ON MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 12, 2016 AND DISCUSSED THE FOLLOWING TOPICS:

OPERATIONS

Gary Miller presented the safety statistics for the previous month, stating BTU had two recordable incidents and no at fault vehicle incident for the month of July. Mr. Miller discussed the circumstances of the two incidents with the Board and stated BTU's current incident rate is 2.65 for Fiscal Year 2016 to date.

All departments are having safety meetings, either as a separate group or combined with other groups. Employees have utilized the Safety Calendar and it has helped improve overall safety meeting attendance.

FINANCIAL

Joe Hegwood presented the financial report and noted that customer revenue is down due to weather. However, that is offset by other factors such that net revenue for the utility is better than budgeted.

BTU's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) spending in the City system is currently under budget due primarily to the timing of transmission and distribution feeder work. BTU's CIP spending in the Rural system is slightly under budget due to project timing. Spending is projected to be on budget by year end.

TRANSMISSION AND DISTRIBUTION REPORT

The SAIDI (System Average Interruption Duration Index) and SAIFI (System Average Interruption Frequence Index) report for the month of August was presented. Mr. Trimble stated the outages with the longest duration were due to equipment failure in the Rural system and lightning and fallen trees in the City system. Overall August was a good month.

THANKSGIVING COOKING TIPS

HERE ARE SOME EASY WAYS TO REDUCE UNNECESSARY ENERGY USE WHILE STILL ENJOYING ALL OF YOUR FAMILY'S FAVORITE DISHES.

DON'T PEEK!

When using the oven, it's tempting to frequently open the door to check on a dish's progress. But every time the oven door is opened, the temperature inside is reduced by as much as 25 degrees, forcing it to work even harder (and use more energy) to get back to the proper cooking temperature. If you need to check on a dish, use the oven window instead.

GIVE YOUR FURNACE THE DAY OFF.

Most of us find ourselves with a houseful of people at least once between now and the New Year. If your next party involves a lot of work for your stove, think about turning down your furnace to compensate. The heat of the oven - and all those guests - will keep the temperature comfortable.

DON'T NEGLECT YOUR CROCKPOT.

Or your microwave, toaster oven, or warming plate. Most of us have a veritable smorgasbord of small kitchen cooking appliances that we rarely use. Putting them to work more often, instead of the oven or stovetop can mean significant energy savings.

TURN IT DOWN OR TURN IT OFF.

For regular cooking, it's probably not necessary to have your oven on as long - or set as high - as the recipe calls for. For recipes that need to bake for longer than an hour, pre-heating the oven isn't always necessary. And if your stovetop or oven is electric, you can usually turn it off 5-10 minutes before the dish should be done and the residual heat will finish the job. Just remember to keep the oven door closed or the lid on until time is up.



CROCK POT DRESSING

Ingredients

1 cup chopped onion

1 cup chopped celery

1/4 cup butter

6 cups cubed day-old white bread

6 cups cubed day-old whole wheat bread

1 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon poultry seasoning

1 teaspoon rubbed sage

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1 can (14-1/2 ounces) reduced-sodium chicken broth or vegetable broth

2 large eggs, beaten

Directions

1. In a small nonstick skillet over medium heat, cook onion and celery in butter until tender.

2. In a large bowl, combine the bread cubes, salt, poultry seasoning, sage and pepper. Stir in

onion mixture. Combine broth and eggs; add to bread mixture and toss to coat.

3. Transfer to a 3-qt. slow cooker coated with cooking spray. Cover and cook on low for 3-4 hours or until a thermometer reads 160°.

Yield: 10 servings.

ENERGY SAVINGS TIPS FOR COLD WEATHER

e want to help you control your energy costs. Instead of reaching for the thermostat when the cool weather comes, here are some winter energy tips to help you stay warm and keep costs down.

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF HEAT FROM THE SUN

• Open curtains on your south-facing windows during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home, and close them at night to reduce the chill you may feel from cold windows.

COVER DRAFTY WINDOWS

- Use a heavy-duty, clear plastic sheet on a frame or tape clear plastic film to the inside of your window frames during the cold winter months. Make sure the plastic is sealed tightly to the frame to help reduce infiltration.
- Install tight-fitting, insulating drapes or shades on windows that feel drafty after weatherizing.

FIND AND SEAL LEAKS

- Seal the air leaks around utility cut-throughs for pipes ("plumbing penetrations"), gaps around chimneys and recessed lights in insulated ceilings, and unfinished spaces behind cupboards and closets.

ADJUST THE TEMPERATURE

- When you are home and awake, set your thermostat as low as is comfortable.
- When you are asleep or out of the house, turn your thermostat back 10° to 15° for eight hours and save around 10% a year on your heating and cooling bills. A programmable thermostat can make keeping your thermostat at a more efficient temperature quick and easy.


- Furnaces: Replace your furnace filter once a month or as needed.
- Wood and Pellet-Burning Heaters: Clean the flue vent regularly and clean the inside of the appliance with a wire brush periodically to ensure that your home is heated efficiently.
