Approval of a Contract for Engineering Services for TxDOT FM 2818 Widening Project

The Board approved a contract with POWER Engineers for project management and design for a TxDOT project along FM 2818 that requires a BTU 138kV underground transmission line relocation.

Approval of a Change Order for the Purchase of Steel Poles for the Snook to Steele Store 138kV Project

The Board approved a change order to the original contract with Techline Inc. for the modification of three steel transmission poles.

Presentation of the Fiscal Year 2020 City and Rural Budget and Recommendation to Bryan City Council

Mr. Gary Miller, General Manager, presented the proposed Fiscal Year 2020 budget. The Board approved a resolution to recommend the proposed budget appropriation to the Bryan City Council.

Establishment of a TMPA Decommissioning Fund

Mr. Joe Hegwood, Chief Financial Officer, presented a resolution to establish a fund devoted to the decommissioning of the Gibbons Creek generating facility. The Board approved the resolution.

TPPA Industry Achievement Award

Vicki Reim, Division Manager of Customer Operations, was awarded the Paula J. DiFonzo Industry Achievement Award by the Texas Public Power Association. This award recognizes women who have made both individual and team contributions to their public power organization.



MIDTOWN MOVING FORWARD

Rich in history, the arts, education and commerce, Bryan's undeniable potential is showcased with the opportunity for master-planned development and redevelopment of Midtown. Over the last year, city staff and consultants have listened to feedback from the community, learned what residents want to see and developed proposed concepts to create a plan for Midtown.

The Midtown Plan will be the principal guide in promoting orderly growth, development and redevelopment of the Midtown area. Bryan's Midtown boundaries include South Texas Avenue and Finfeather Road from the Bryan/College Station city limit to revitalized historic Downtown. The Midtown area is a premiere landscape for significant sustainable development that can accommodate growing demand for quality housing, commercial services, restaurants and entertainment while enhancing the existing neighborhood fabric within this important corridor.

THE DRAFT PLAN

City of Bryan staff worked with consultants Miller Boskus Lack Architects and multiple sub-consultants to research and draft the Midtown Plan, which will be presented to the Bryan City Council for approval in late fall of 2019. General proposed concepts include building in additional quality and flexibility into the South College zoning districts and recommendations for how to maximize the area's development and redevelopment potential. Each of the pieces of the plan are voluntary, giving property owners the flexibility to choose whether the recommendations are right for them.

The main goal of this process is to help strengthen Midtown's contribution to the great quality of life that Bryan is known for providing to residents and visitors. *The draft Midtown plan includes:*

- Five "experience districts," which are focused planning areas that incorporate physical, cultural and social realms to align and advance a desired way of living, working and playing while clearly distinguishing the unique personality of an area.
- Catalytic sites within the experience districts, which create opportunities for partnership between the city and developers with the intent to create distinct destinations with their own unique experiences.
- Pattern zoning that would allow additional building options specifically designed to maintain neighborhood integrity of the various areas in Midtown. This voluntary program includes permitready home plans in a variety of price points and living styles.
- Improvements to South College Avenue, including a potential shared use path and an increase in the number of street trees.

These ideas follow the core principles of the plan, which include:

- A dynamic and aesthetically pleasing South College Avenue Corridor
- · Complete, connected and safe neighborhoods
- · Future neighborhood infill development
- Opportunities to reuse existing structures when feasible
- The alignment of cultural, social, legal, financial and institutional structures.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

The Midtown Area Plan process included significant efforts to engage the community. The Bryan City Council appointed a Midtown Area Plan Advisory Committee comprised of Midtown residents; neighborhood organizations; local business owners and real estate developers; representatives of local trade, tourism and economic development groups; and representatives from the Bryan Business Council, Planning and Zoning Commission, Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, and City Council.

Staff and consultants held four in-person public workshops, where residents were encouraged to share their thoughts about what they wanted the Midtown area to be. The city also encouraged input through a variety of traditional and digital media, including a dedicated website, video recaps of the public meetings, online surveys, appearances on television and local radio, email updates, and information posted to social media.

THE PATH FORWARD

A draft of the plan will first go to the Bryan Planning & Zoning Commission, which will send a recommendation to the Bryan City Council in late fall. If approved, the principles of the Midtown Area Plan could move from concept to reality quickly. First, the proposed zoning changes would go before the Council for consideration, and if approved, voluntary construction of pattern zoning buildings could begin as early as spring 2020.

Other aspects of this dynamic plan could also see quick progress. If funded, the City could continue to improve South College Avenue by incorporating additional trees and wider sidewalks for pedestrian use. The Corridor Beautification Partnership (CBP) grant, which allows nonresidential property owners to apply for reimbursement funding to update the exteriors of their businesses, is planned to be expanded to include South College Avenue by the end of 2019. The city will also work with property owners at the proposed catalytic sites to determine their interest and readiness to move forward with the proposed catalytic projects, but exact timing will be determined by property owners.

VICKI REIM Customer Operations Division Manager AWARDED PAULA J. DIFONZO INDUSTRY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

At the Texas Public Power Association (TPPA) Annual Meeting in July, Bryan Texas Utilities' Division Manager of Customer Operations Vicki Reim was awarded the Paula J. DiFonzo Industry Achievement Award. According to TPPA, this award recognizes women in public power who have made outstanding leadership and individual contributions to their public power system in Texas. Vicki exemplifies these requirements with her longstanding commitment to public power.

Vicki has been a pillar of women's involvement in the public power industry for more than 30 years, first joining BTU in 1986. In her initial position, she served as an Energy Auditor, closely interacting with customers to advise on energy efficiency measures and consumer options. She climbed the ranks at BTU, now overseeing the department that she worked in directly out of college, along with several others. She has ushered in many technological advancements at BTU, including being heavily involved in transitioning to AMI (Automated Metering Infrastructure), working to offer more payment options (i.e. bank draft, budget billing), and many software upgrades and changes.

In the industry, Vicki has chaired numerous committees and conferences at both the state and national levels. She chaired the Texas Public Power Association (TPPA) Marketing and Customer Service Conference for 12 years. She also served as committee chair and section chair for the American Public Power Association's (APPA) Customer Connections Conference, a four-year commitment. She also takes time to develop and encourage other women in public power. Many of her direct reports are female, and she advocates for, educates, and advises those women to succeed.

Vicki has represented BTU and served the community well by being involved in the Junior League of Bryan/College Station, Scotty's House (a Child Advocacy Center), the Women's Leadership Council, and several church committees. Vicki currently serves as the President of Bryan/College Station Chamber of Commerce and sits on the board of directors of the Boys and Girls Club of the Brazos Valley. Her involvement in the community reinforces TPPA's message of a committed, caring, community-powered utility.



THE FIRST ANNUAL GIVING DAY – Brazos Valley Gives will be held on Tuesday, October 22, 2019 from 5 AM to 11 PM.
