Approval of a Professional Services Contract for Architecture Services


The Board approved a contract with Singleton Simmer Haliburton Architecture PC for architectural design services for the new BTU Administration Building.






Elizabeth

Communities served by public power utilities experience higher reliability. On average, public power customers have service interruptions lasting 62 minutes a year, compared to 150 minutes on average for investor owned utilities. In 2020, BTU outages lasted just 19 minutes on average. BTU invests in vegetation management, system design, and other aspects to keep the electric grid functioning as reliably as possible.

Public power customers can also expect to pay less than those served by investor owned utilities. Across the nation, public utility customers pay 12 percent less than investor owned utility customers. BTU's rates are even more economical that the national average. BTU also maintains goals to keep rates stable and predictable, insulating customers from market variabilities.

When a customer calls in to receive assistance from BTU, they will speak with a customer service representative located in an office in downtown Bryan. Since all of the employees live in the Brazos Valley community, they are able to serve their neighbors, friends, and customers with a matchless perspective. BTU is proud to have served the citizens of Bryan and the Brazos Valley for more than 100 years, and looks forward to the next century of public power.









Halloween is a fun time for kids and adults alike. Trick-or-treating and costume parties typically require extra attention to safety because they take place during the evening hours. Keep these important safety tips in mind at all times during this spooky holiday:

 Choose costumes and bags that have reflective tape and/or bright colors to help drivers see kids at night.

- Use specific pumpkin carving tools instead of a sharp kitchen knife to carve a jack-o-lantern. Carve from the top down rather than from the bottom up to minimize the chance of injury.
- According to Safekids.org, children under 12 years of age should trick-or-treat under adult supervision. Remind kids to stay in groups to make it easier for drivers to see them.
- Kids should be constantly reminded to walk, not run, while trick-or-treating. Injuries from falls are common due to hampered vision from darkness and trip hazards from costumes.
- · Include glow stick necklaces and bracelets as part of your child's costume.
- After trick-or-treating, check all candy and treats for signs of tampering. Discard candy if the wrapper is faded or torn, as well as homemade treats from sources you do not fully trust.



HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE DAY

Saturday, October 30 / 7 AM to 2 PM / TAMU Services Building

Twin Oaks Landfill is once again holding a FREE household hazardous waste collection event at the Texas A&M University Services Building located on Old Ti Road (just north of Veterans Park) on Saturday, October 30th from 7:00 am to 2:00 pm. This event is for Brazos County residents, and participants are asked to enter Old Ti Road from Harvey Road, then exit onto University Drive after their items have been dropped off.

Most household and garden chemicals, medicines, paints, and automotive waste will be accepted for disposal. Commercial waste, regular household garbage, appliances, and tires are among the waste that will not be accepted.

Every year since 1922, the National Fire Prevention Association has sponsored the observance of Fire Prevention Week. This event is observed each year during the week in which October 9 falls in order to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire that began on October 8, 1871. The Chicago fire destroyed over 17,400 structures and killed over 250 people.

National Fire Prevention Week begins Sunday, October 3rd and ends Saturday, October 9th. This year's theme is "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety," which focuses on understanding the sounds made by smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. The catchphrase for this theme is "Hear a beep, get on your feet! Hear a chirp, make a change!"

SMOKE ALARMS

- A series of three long beeps means smoke or fire. If you hear three beeps, get everyone out of the house and call 9-1-1. Do not attempt to re-enter the house.
- A single brief "chirp" every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed. If the chirping continues after a new battery has been installed, it means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS

- A continuous series of four loud beeps means carbon monoxide has been detected. If you hear this alarm, get everyone out of the house, call 9-1-1, and stay out of the house.
- Just like a smoke alarm, a carbon monoxide alarm will chirp every 30 or 60 seconds when the battery is low. If the alarm continues to chirp after replacing the battery, the unit must be replaced.
- Many new alarm devices combine smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and come with sealed 10-year batteries that never need changing. Simply replace the unit when it chirps.
